The practical coaching assessment must be completed in their workplace environment. The demonstration of coaching activity must be a minimum of 40 minutes in duration either in the form of a single session, or a series of shorter microsessions. Where Learners have completed the 40-minute demonstration this will supersede the two x 20 minute from the delivery of coaching sessions, where all assessment criteria have been met.
