Qualification Objective:	This qualification qualifies learners to become an assistant coach for equestrian (western) sessions.
Qualification Purpose:	Develop knowledge and/or skills in a subject area.

Who is this qualification for?

The qualification is designed for those who wish to become involved in coaching as an assistant equestrian coach. It is directed at learners who have an interest in coaching equestrian as an assistant.

Qualification Progression

The skills and knowledge developed may also be used to enable learners to progress to other industry-relevant qualifications in equestrian coaching, such as the Level 2 Qualification in Equestrian Coaching. Learners may also be able to access British Equestrian Federation regional Continual Professional Development workshops.

This qualification may lead to paid employment or unpaid voluntary roles in equestrian coaching, as an assistant coach. Other roles that the learner may consider exploring include Activity Leader, Official, or Sports Volunteer.

Entry Requirements

Learners must be a minimum of 16 years old at registration and 16 years old at certification.

Pre-requisite(s) or other entry requirements

The recognised centre is required to conduct an initial assessment of learners to ensure that pre-requisites to registration and certification and any barriers that may disadvantage a learner under the Equality Act 2010 are considered and outcomes recorded during the application process.

Prior to registration learners are required to:

- be accurately identified
- be at least 16 years of age
- be able to undertake this assessment in English or Welsh (if available)

Assessment Methods

The assessment methods used in this qualification are:

- Coursework (in 3 of 3 mandatory units),
- Practical Demonstration/Assignment (in 3 of 3 mandatory units)

Grading Methods

This qualification will be graded Pass / Fail.

Qualification Conditions: Delivery and assessment requirements

Assessor(s):

The recognised centre is required to recruit and deploy approved assessors. The assessors are responsible for the delivery of the qualification. Approved qualification assessors are required to:

- provide evidence that they hold coaching/teaching qualification at a level above the level they are applying to coach educate at

Internal Verifier(s) and Quality Assurer(s):

For this qualification, the minimum requirements stated in the centre handbook do not apply. Centres must ensure that all workforce meet the requirements stated below.

The recognised centre is required to recruit and deploy approved Internal Quality Assurers who are responsible for the Internal Quality Assurance of the qualification. Approved IQA's are required to:

- provide evidence that they hold coaching/teaching qualification at a level above the level they are applying to assess

Additional Qualification Requirements

The minimum venue, facility and requirements stated in the centre handbook apply.

The recognised centre is required to have one or more delivery sites with facilities to support the programme of training and assessment. All delivery sites must include the following:

- car parking and toilets
- either one 30m x 60m arena, or two 20m x 40m arenas suitable for Racing
- male and female changing facilities
